Natives in the Yard • Anhinga or Cormorant?

There are two similar birds that are found in the lakes in our community. The *Anhinga* and *Double-crested Cormorant* are frequently confused. They are both black birds that dive from the surface under the water to fish. They are also seen perched in trees with wings spread to dry their feathers in the sun. They are completely different birds. In this article, I'd like to explain the differences between the two.

The Anhinga has a long neck and a thin pointed bill. It is sometimes called a "snake bird" because when swimming in the water, its body is completely submerged and only his neck and head are above water. The adult's white wing feathers are easily spotted when they spread their wings to dry and the female's chest and neck feathers are lighter than the males'. The Anhinga has a unique technique for fishing. The bird will dive under the water and literally spear its catch. It then swims to the surface with the fish impaled on the beak. Most times it will shake its head vigorously to flip the fish into its mouth and swallow it headfirst. Sometimes the Anhinga's strike is so powerful that it must swim to shore and attempt to pry the fish off his beak by rubbing it against rocks or the ground.

The Anhinga is found from Florida to North Carolina and west to Texas. It prefers freshwater and coastal aquatic habitats such as lakes, marshes, swamps, mangrove swamps, shallow coastal bays and lagoons. It feeds mostly on fish but it will eat other aquatic animals such as insects and frogs. Because it does not have any insulating body feathers or oil coating its feathers, it

is necessary for the Anhinga to sun itself to warm up and dry out.

The *Double-crested Cormorant,* the most numerous and widespread cormorant in North America, is easily distinguished

from the Anhinga by its bill. It is blunt and hooked at the tip. Unlike the Anhinga, its body remains above the water while swimming. The plumadult age is all black with a greenish gloss and

the bare skin around it face is orange. The cormorant uses a different fishing method than the Anhinga. It dives from the surface, chases the fish and catches it with its bill. If it is small enough, the fish is swallowed while the cormorant is still under water. Larger

fish must be brought to the surface before they are swallowed.

The DoublecrestedCormorant is found throughout Florida, too. Its range is more extensive than the Anhinga and is found all

through North America both inland and on the coast. It has the same habitat and diet as the Anhinga. It also must sun itself to warm up and dry out.

You can see why it's easy to confuse these birds, but I hope you now look more carefully at the diving bird in the lake or the one sunning in the tree. Ask yourself, is the bill pointed or hooked? *Pointed bill is an Anhinga and a hooked bill is a Double-crested Cormorant.* Once you've determined that, then you can look for the other identifying characteristics.

Who Are We and What Do We Do for the Park?

Any people, who are not familiar with the Friends organization, ask who we are and what we do to benefit the Park. To best explain, let's start with our Mission Statement:

The mission of the Friends of MacArthur Beach State Park is to generate and allocate supplemental resources and support to preserve and enhance the John D. MacArthur Beach State Park and its programs.

The Friends were founded as a Citizens Support Organization in 1990, shortly after the Park was opened. We are a fully charitable 501(c) 3 organization. There is a 30 member Board of Directors and over 500 individuals and families maintain

membership in the Friends organization.

Quite simply, while the Park's volunteer organization actively participates in the Park's programs and facilities maintenance, the Friends generate financial resources to support and enhance the Park's programs and facilities.

Since its inception, the Friends has raised over \$1,000,000 for the Park Picnic pavilions, resurfacing of the boardwalk, playground equipment, trams, utility vehicles, computers, software, food for the animals, printing of Park brochures, underwriting NatureScaping, and summer camp. The majority of the annual recurring support is provided through profits generated by membership fees, the Gift Shop and



kayak rentals.

The Island in Time Capital Campaign was organized specifically to raise money for the construction of the new Education and Welcome Center, as well as to upgrade and expand the exhibits in the Nature Center. This \$2,000,000 campaign is well underway and we anticipate beginning construction later this year or early in 2009.

Summer Fun at MacBeach

If you're like me, you probably can't believe that summer is already here—when life in South Florida slows down. Seasonal residents have left and won't be back until the fall. School children are out of the classroom for the summer and are looking for activities to fill their days. Here at John D. MacArthur Beach State Park, summer is one of the busiest and most exciting times of the year.

Guided Reef Tours are in full swing by the beginning of July. If you are an experienced swimmer and snorkeler, then call the Nature Center to sign up for the Guided Reef Tour. It is one of our visitor favorites, and here is just one of the reasons why: imagine snorkeling in shallow crystal clear water on one of the most beautiful limestone reefs in South Florida, and suddenly you come face to face with a loggerhead sea turtle, a spiny lobster and schools of rainbow colored fish all at once. This experience and more, including sightings of spotted eagle rays, octopus, reef squid, moray eels, and schools of big snook and tarpon are common occurrences on the Reef Tours. The two-hour program begins at 10:00 a.m. in the Nature Center theater with an informative presentation. Next, participants walk to the beach to join Park staff and volunteers for an underwater adventure. The Reef Tours are every Saturday in June, July and August. Participants must be at least 10 years of age, and all participants under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult. Please call the Nature Center for reservations.

Summer Turtle Walks are a must-see. Loggerhead sea turtles have been coming to

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the Park's shores for thousands of years. After spending 15 to 20 years maturing in the ocean, female loggerheads are ready to nest. On some nights, over 50 loggerhead sea turtles nest on the Park's 1.6 miles of beach. On the evening of a Turtle Walk, visitors first gather in the Nature Center for a short introduction to the biology and life history of sea turtles and then are guided by Park staff and volunteers along the beach to find and observe a three hundred pound, three foot long loggerhead sea turtle perform one of nature's amazing feats. The program costs \$5 per person and takes place in June and July with twenty scheduled walks throughout those two months. Reservations by phone are required, and young children under the age of eight are not encouraged, due to the nature of the activity.

Do you want to learn to surf? Ranger Rob Matriscino will conduct his popular Introduction to Surfing class in July. Rob will teach you the proper way to paddle and stand up on a surfboard. With a little practice Rob will get you up and ripping the curl in no time. If you have a surfboard, please bring it. If you don't have a board, there will be a few available for you to try out.
